**CPOA Convention Addresses Budget Cuts:** The California Peace Officers Association (CPOA) held its conference in Monterey this week. There was discussion on the fiscal crises that is facing California and the affect on peace officers. CCSO is a member of CPOA and works with this association in a united front when it comes to legislation. The task ahead is running police departments, county jails, and state prisons with major cuts being proposed. To date, there have been up to 3600 layoff notices sent to CDCR employees. Most of the notices were given to CDCR officers with 15 months or less on the job. The CPOA presenters addressed CDCR's proposals to send less-violent inmates back to county jails. This is becoming a "hot potato" as county jails are already crowded and cannot take additional inmates.

**Voters Say No To Increased TAXES:** California voters rejected the propositions 1A through 1E this week, which would have increased taxes to patch the state budget's deficit. Legislators are now faced with finding money to solve a \$21 billion budget deficit.

CCSO is and will continue to communicate with legislators, DPA, and CDCR, to offer recommendations to cutback in areas that will not negatively affect benefits and/or salaries of supervisors and managers. Currently, there is much discussion happening in Sacramento, but no final decisions have been made at this update.
